



Nariyal Paani - Music Curators

Since 2015, the project has created immersive performances that celebrate sound, place, and community, presenting both Indian and international artists with care and attention.

Founded by Tanvi Gupta and Siddhanth Kapoor in Alibaug, Nariyal Paani transformed open-air, seaside spaces into platforms for discovery and shared listening. Now based in Goa and led by Tanvi Gupta and Ayudh Roy, the project continues to produce music events that prioritize atmosphere, engagement, and thoughtful curation.



Sachin Chatte - Film Curator

Sachin Chatte returns as the Film Curator for Goa Open Arts Festival 2026, continuing his long-standing association with the festival. With over three decades of film criticism behind him, Sachin has consistently guided audiences through cinema with insight, curiosity, and a deep love for the medium.

Based in Goa, Sachin has been a film critic since 1993 and a longtime contributor to The Navhind Times. A member of FIPRESCI, he has curated films for the Cinephile Film Club under the Entertainment Society of Goa and served on several film juries, bringing a deep critical lens to cinema.



Avril Stormy Unger - Queer As In... Curator

Avril Stormy Unger is a performance and live artist with a multi-sensory, experience-based approach. Her practice is informed by personal experience, using the body in and as a process of healing recurrent trauma. Working through themes of queerness, gender, sexuality, abuse, religious oppression, and patterned behaviours within the cultural contexts she navigates, she locates the language for her work.

Sheldon Fonseca



The Banjara Trio

Banjara Trio has been playing gypsy jazz for over 13 years. The genre originated in 1930s France, pioneered by Django Reinhardt and Stéphane Grappelli, and remains a rare and niche musical style. Banjara Trio was the first band in the country dedicated to this genre. Though based in Goa, the trio performs widely across the country.

The Lojal Experience

Formed in 2019 as a solo project, Lojal (pronounced Loyaal) quickly emerged as a promising name on the Indian independent circuit. Even before releasing major music, he built momentum through extensive independent tours across India, sharing stages and collaborating with key figures in the scene. His debut album "Phase" (2020) received strong critical acclaim, including **Rolling Stone's Top 5 Indian Albums of 2020**, along with recognition from platforms like Wild City, Homegrown, and Lifted Asia.

Shivam & The Gypsies is a high-energy Gypsy Balkan band that brings the soulful rhythms and melodies of the Balkans to life.



Sanjay Divecha

Sanjay Divecha is of the most revered guitar players in India. A unique and compelling voice as a player and composer, he is part of the hugely successful supergroup CROSS CURRENTS led by Zakir Hussain and featuring stalwarts such as Dave Holland, Vinnie Colaiuta, Chris Potter, Eddie Daniels, Shankar Mahadevan and Louiz Banks. Through a luminous 35 year long career, Sanjay has worked with artists such as Angelique Kidjo, Carlos Santana, Michael McDonald, Fred Raulston, Dave Weckl, Louis Johnson, Dumazz and Sambaguru among others. He also collaborated with A.R. Rahman on the Danny Boyle movie "127 Hours" that won 'Best Original Score', the OST for the movie "Woman on Top" with Argentinean composer Luis Bacalov, Sanjay also done the score for the movie 'Leela' by Somnath Sen which won a Special Jury Award at Toronto Reel World Film Festival. An alumnus (1989) from Musician's Institute (M.I) in Los Angeles, Sanjay continues to mentor and develop musicians all over the country. His students are not only guitar players, but musicians and singers of all disciplines. Sanjay teaches private lessons and holds workshops to develop musicality and a well rounded aesthetic sensibility in musicians.

The filmmaker poignantly captures his grandmother's daily life in her home in Goa, while offering a heartfelt exploration of themes such as ageing, belonging, community, intergenerational dynamics and loneliness.

This intimate experimental short film attempts to push the boundaries of what can be considered cinema.

Turtle Walker (75 mins)



Created by young filmmakers, it is both a love letter and a listening exercise.

As Bali agrees to do a favour for a regular customer, so begins his relationship with Charlie, a petty crook and a schemer, who takes Bali on a wild journey unravelling the mysteries of karma, where fortune is never what it seems.





A street in downtown Warsaw transforms into a kaleidoscopic portrait of Polish society. Behind the viewfinder is an Indian immigrant, who seeks to overcome the boundaries between himself and an anxiety-ridden country.

Virundhu (25mins)

Tamil, Drama, 2024

The film, inspired by the Pulicat Lake fisherwomen's October 2021 protest against the threats to the local biodiversity, tells the story of a prawn picker Mary who is distraught by the expanding ambitions of a factory where her daughter Josie works. It spews untreated effluents into the nourishing waters of her beloved lake. Caught between the risk of Josie losing her job and the prospect of losing the lake, Mary makes her choice with a desperate plan to convince fellow villager turned politician Thomas to stop the factory.

Manorama Six Feet Under (137mins)

Hindi, Thriller/Crime, 2007

Manorama, the wife of an irrigation minister, tasks a junior engineer and part-time novelist, Satyaveer Randhawa, to find out if her husband is cheating. As Satyaveer starts investigating, he finds himself trapped in a web of lies and deception. In the desert, nothing is as it seems.

The film depicts the peculiar frame of mind of an old Goan lady living a lonely life in her village home. Her loneliness and the resulting anguish drive her to find solace by gossip mongering. She finds pleasure in meddling in the affairs of others but at times, she displays feelings of guilt too.

Ful Ani Sauli (8mins)

In a quiet village, a young artist and a solitary woman form an unlikely bond over tea, sketches, and silence. As their connection deepens, strange echoes of familiarity emerge, blurring timelines and memory - revealing that some friendships may bloom across more than just distance or age.



A tale of triumph, loss and longing, Taanagh takes us on intertwined journeys through the hockey pitch and across borders. It invites us to relive newly-independent India's triumph at the 1948 Olympics through the fading recollections of 2 hockey legends, before setting out on a search for their old friend and teammate whom they lost to Partition. Inspired by her ailing father (Nandy) and his indomitable spirit, Bani offers a compelling account, enriched by interviews, rare archival footage & snapshots of her own quest to piece together broken fragments.

Axar N



Slackertendency

Slackertendency is a multidisciplinary designer and visual artist working at the intersection of motion, interaction, and playful experimentation. Her practice blends graphic design, animation, live coding, and spatial storytelling to create work that feels curious and tactile.

Sachi

Sachi's sound sits between jazz and restraint — softened with R&B and faint folk undercurrents. Moody, blues-leaning, and unhurried, his songwriting is a meditative, personal process. He doesn't decide what emerges; the music does, revealing intimate fragments of the self.

Brahma


Brahma is an artist and cultural practitioner working through movement practice and pedagogy. Their work is grounded in contemporary dance and extends into ritual-based and sonic enquiry, with a sustained interest in how memory and power are negotiated through the body.

As a gender non-binary artist, Brahma approaches artistic creation as a process of negotiating safety in lived and shared experience. Safety is understood not as a fixed condition but as an evolving practice of care and attention. This understanding shapes how their work is made and shared.




Sumedh

Sumedh is a filmmaker, writer and comic. He spends his time working around food and comedy. His debut short *Vinchu*, played at MAMI and DIFF. The film was about a closeted gay man working in the propaganda division of a right wing political party called the *Vinchu Sena*.



Asher

Asher is interested in exploring the idea of being understood, in relation to his neurodivergence, queerness, the people around him, and in the sense of existing without needing to perform. Often, Asher feels like his truest resistance is through his existence itself; raw, unchallengeable, and unmoving. He feels that growing up in Panjim moulded his queer identity while also suppressing it. Asher attempts to reclaim his authentic, raw expression in all areas of his creative life, from his architecture to his music. Indie and alternative music were the constants of Asher's adolescence, and he draws inspiration from the ideas of alt he grew up with while also challenging them with his indie alt-rock band, Hous.



AleXela

In her performances, AleXela (b.2001) presents a viewing of herself. Some acquired, some self-imposed and often overlapping, she enjoys the shift between these viewings. Raised catholic, with a degree in design, her staged pieces examine the interplay between stripping away layers and thereby acquiring new ones. Alex lives and works in Goa.



Dhaee Aakhar Goa is a group of individuals sharing common love and passion for art, culture, literature, and ecology. It began its journey in 2018. This seven-year-old group conducts various events like story-reading, play presentations, and also online talks and presentations on topics related to art, culture, and ecology based on stories of renowned writers like Saadat Hasan Manto, Premchand, Kashinath Singh, Girish Karnad, Damodar Mauzo, Manohar Rai SarDessai, Jayanti, Naik to name a few. From the story he created my persona where he hyperfixates on a certain theme or idea and creates 7 posts and then dies a horrible and gruesome death on the last post. So far in his death posts he has had my head chopped off, castrated, split in half and burned at the stake. He takes heavy inspiration from Christian art and imagery. Growing up Catholic comes with its deep seated traumas and guilt and he plays into that when he creates my looks. He likes to showcase trauma and darkness through the medium of drag as much as possible. He gravitates towards a lot of gore and special effects for the same reason. There is something very fascinating about turning something horrifying into something beautiful.

VAMONA NAVELCAR : AT THE EDGE OF THE VOLCANO

This project is an original English play based on the life and artistic journey of renowned Goan artist Vamona Sinai Navelcar, whose career spanned Asia, Europe, and Africa. The play explores his personal struggles, creative resilience, and the socio-cultural contexts that shaped his practice. Originally conceptualised by acclaimed playwright Dr. Isabel de Santa Rita Vas and later developed by Dnyanesh Moghe, the work combines archival research and creative storytelling to document both the historical and emotional landscapes of art-making in Goa.

Dnyanesh Moghe is a theatre and film director whose practice spans across English, Marathi, Hindi, and Konkani language. With over 25 productions and multiple awards to his name, Dnyanesh's work moves through myth, memory, and contemporary social realities with equal force.
